A friend introduced me to a girl he escort-

ed to the weekly dances. I asked Maureen to dance. Miss Stone clerked at Lloyds Bank. As we fox trotted, I learned she spent four years as a boarding student at Notre Dame High School in Northampton, England. I replied that I was from a different Northampton, and also a Catholic high school graduate. Bingo!

My idea of romance was to sing softly in my partner's ear. Maureen must have loved Ira Gershwin's lyrics, as did this believer of life idealized in Technicolor musicals.

Not for a year, but ever and a day.

It became our song. Note the clever combining of UK's Gibraltar and America's Rockies. As homefront children, we were aware of the "Special Relationship" between our nations in war and peace.

In keeping with mufti, I ordered a \$78 Donegal Tweed suit from a London tailor who came on base to measure up classy dressers. Maureen revealed she could spot any American by the swagger in their walk.

Five-foot three Maureen had an Audrey Hepburn vibe, was a mad tennis player, dressed conservatively, believed in God, with reservations about certain clergy. Maureen had a mind of her own.

> My new girlfriend read books, liked the theater, performed in The Mikado at school and enjoyed life... I realized I was dating a sophisticate, in process of gaining my own Fair Lady, with a late nod toward Julie Andrews, Eliza Doolittle, and George Bernard Shaw. It was a growing-up time; we floated along like a boat in a Tunnel of Love. Our courtship set sail.

Following a dozen Saturday night dances, spring was on the horizon. I asked her for a proper date, which had its challenges. Maureen

told her folks that she was bringing a boy home for tea, but not an American.

Her mum, Evelyn, was warm and welcoming. Her dad, Eddie, was an electrician who, like most fathers, didn't spark to young men with designs on their daughters. Thanks to Mum Stone, I enjoyed their "tea" indeed. Maureen had a 10-year-old brother, Paul. He and I have since shared vacations, like borrowing a Jeep to follow Ike's route to Normandy for the 50th anniversary of D-Day. We closed our age gap to 80 and 90 last month.

When it came to it, sharing a religion may have been the closer. Another clincher was our first kiss at the local bus stop. In the custom of first dates I bent to kiss Maureen on the lips. She returned it.

There's nothing that says "New England" like a sugarhouse breakfast! One of my earliest memories is Dad taking us kids to a dark and steamy sugarhouse where a nice old farmer poured samples of hot syrup in tiny pleated paper cups. The taste was pure heaven, and so was the steam in the room! A sensory delight I never forgot.

As winter lingers on, I look forward to maple season. I like to **support our local sugarhouses**. They usually open in late February and are listed in the newspaper or online. A lovely treat to welcome the beginning of Spring! **Or make your own pancakes, served with pure maple syrup**:

Good Old Fashioned Pancakes

- 1 1/2 cups all purpose flour
- 3 1/2 tsp baking powder
- 1 tbsp sugar
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1 1/4 cup milk
- 3 tbsp melted butter



Sift flour, baking powder, sugar, and salt together in a large bowl. Make a well in the center and add milk, melted butter, and egg; mix until smooth.

Heat a lightly oiled griddle or pan over mediumhigh heat. Pour or scoop the batter onto the griddle, using approximately 1/4 cup for each pancake; cook until bubbles form and the edges are dry, about 2 to 3 minutes. Flip and cook until browned on the other side. Repeat with remaining batter.

Tiny footprints

As soon as a child is born and their photo is posted online, they have a digital footprint. While we enjoy seeing a new baby's smiling face or a toddler smelling a flower, their digital footprint can be hacked. That is just the very sad story of how our technology today can be misused. A scammer can set up a fake identity, therefore messing up the child's future finances before they are even earning any money. A baby's digital image can be altered and used in pornography.

A recent article in the Washington Post was sobering. They projected over 7 million cases of identity fraud by 2030, costing victims more than \$900 million. It is believed that over half the porn images online in one country were photoshopped from social media. This is from a book by Leah Plunkett Sharenthood: *Why We Should Think Before We Talk About Our Kids Online.*

So what should parents and other family members do?

1. Be CAREFUL when posting online even if you think you are safe. Do not post full names, birthdays, ages, or specific locations.

2. Set up privacy settings on your social media. See this page- www.nytimes.com/wirecutter/guides/online -security-social-media-privacy/ Even setting privacy controls is no guarantee the child is safe. The controls can be complicated and change, and even if a crook can't download an image, they can take a new photo of what was posted and photoshop it.

3. Take another look at passwords. Many times people use birthplace, school name, favorite pet, etc. in a password. These are things commonly written about in a post; 3 or 4 pieces of information may be all that is needed by the hacker to steal an identity.

February's Good News

It's that time of year again when we are gathering what we need to file our tax returns, and I received a request for information on the Circuit Breaker which I wrote about last March. This year's potential Circuit Breaker rebate may be even bigger than previous years, so this is the time to look into it and see if you might qualify.

Circuit Breaker Fact Sheet

"You may get a cash refund on your State income taxes."

The Massachusetts Circuit Breaker Income Tax Credit for Homeowners age 65 and older is a program for those seniors whose property taxes and half of the water/sewer bills equal more than 10% of their annual gross income. You can get this refundable tax credit even if you do not owe State income taxes. You can file a tax return even if you do not have taxable income.

Last year the maximum refund was \$1,162, but Governor Baker has recommended in his 2023 budget that this be increased to a maximum of \$2400.

If you have not filed/applied for the Circuit Breaker before, this is the year to do it!

You are eligible if:

- \Rightarrow you are 65 or older
- \Rightarrow own your home
- \Rightarrow are current with your property taxes
- ⇒ and if your property taxes are more than 10% of your income
- ⇒ your income needs to be less than \$62,000 single, or \$93.000 married filing a joint income tax return
- \Rightarrow and if your home is assessed at less than \$884,000

You apply by:

- \Rightarrow filing a Massachusetts Income Tax return
- \Rightarrow and including a schedule CB
- \Rightarrow you must supply copy of your property tax bill
- \Rightarrow also your water/sewer bill if you have one
- \Rightarrow and provide income verification
